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## II.1 Preface

This is the **Fact Book**. While we attempted to incorporate all suggestions, there are a few notable changes. The most notable change is the format being used for the **Fact Book**. We have discarded the windows help file format in lieu of an Adobe Acrobat file. This decision was based on the need to distribute the **Fact Book** in a format that is universally readable, web-ready, and highly accepted. In this edition, an additional table, “Median Class Size” was added to the Highlights section. Moreover, for Table IV.2 (Degrees Conferred by Major, Race, and Sex), Table V.1 (Comparative Discipline Cost Study), and Table V.2 (Credit Hours Generated by Programs Annually), the figures were rearranged so that the most recent year appears first.

Please note that Table V.1 (Comparative Discipline Cost Study) presents credit hours generated by students in the declared major. This is different from the credit hours presented in Table V.2 (Credit Hours Generated by Program Annually). Whereas the former represents hours generated by students in the declared major including courses from other programs, the latter, on the other hand, represents the actual credit hours generated by the program for all students enrolled in courses offered by the program, including students from other majors. Both sets of data are useful and presentable, depending on the question asked.

Finally, it is clear by now that no single document can meet all of the university’s operational needs. This publication, therefore, is intended to serve as a useful reference. 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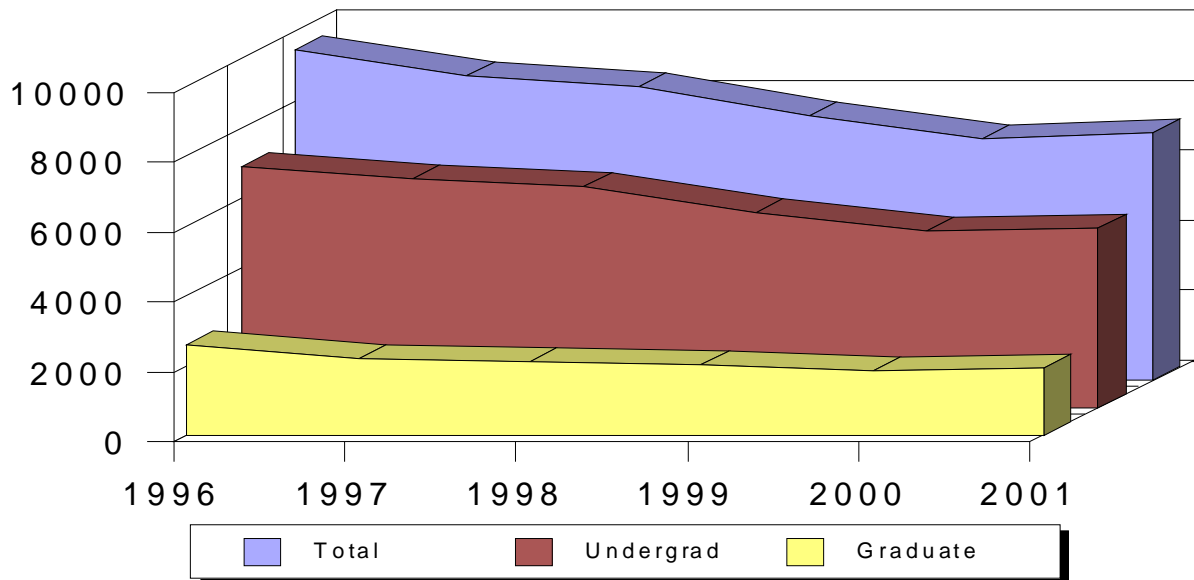

### CSU ENROLLMENT SUMMARY 1996 - 2001



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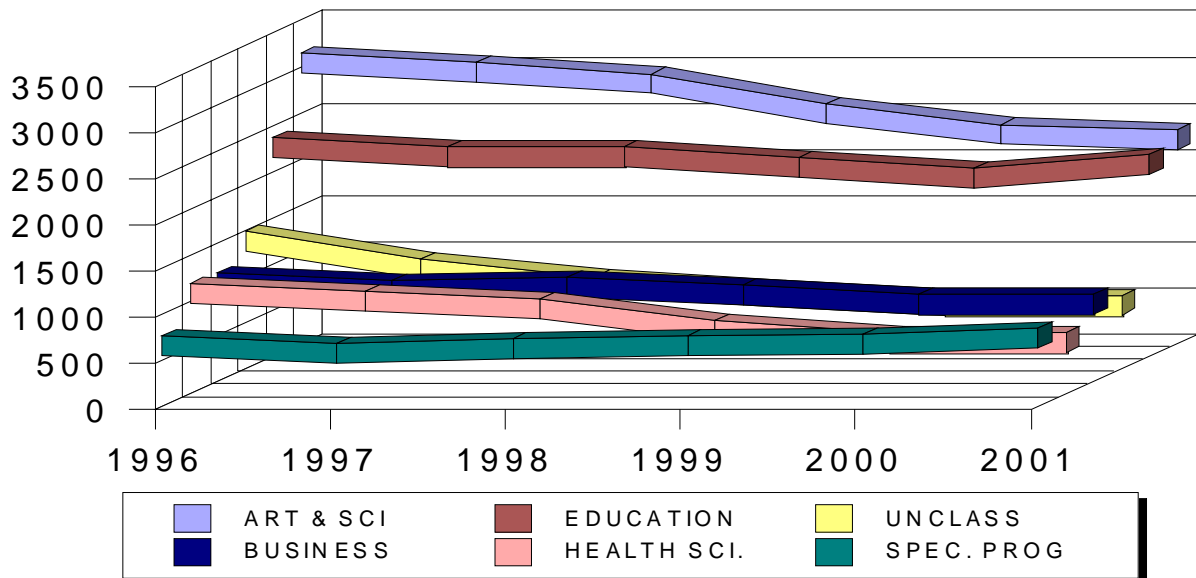

1996 - 2001



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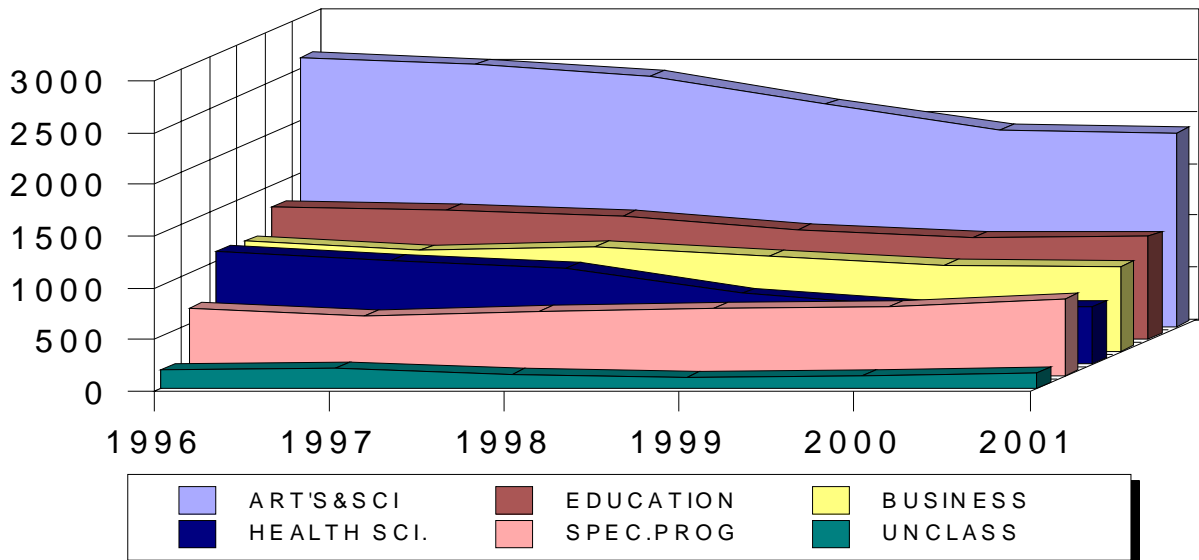

## UNDERGRADUATE BY COLLEGE 1996 - 2001



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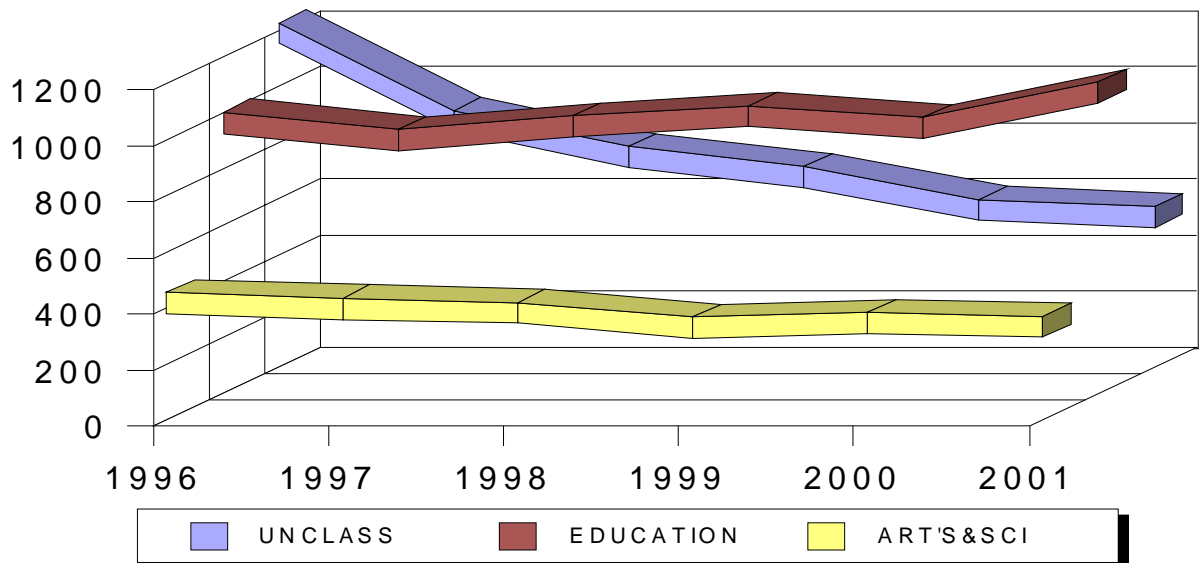

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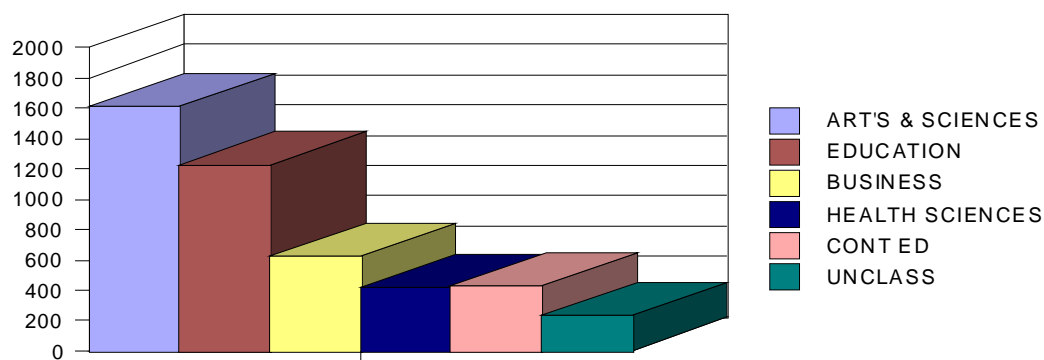

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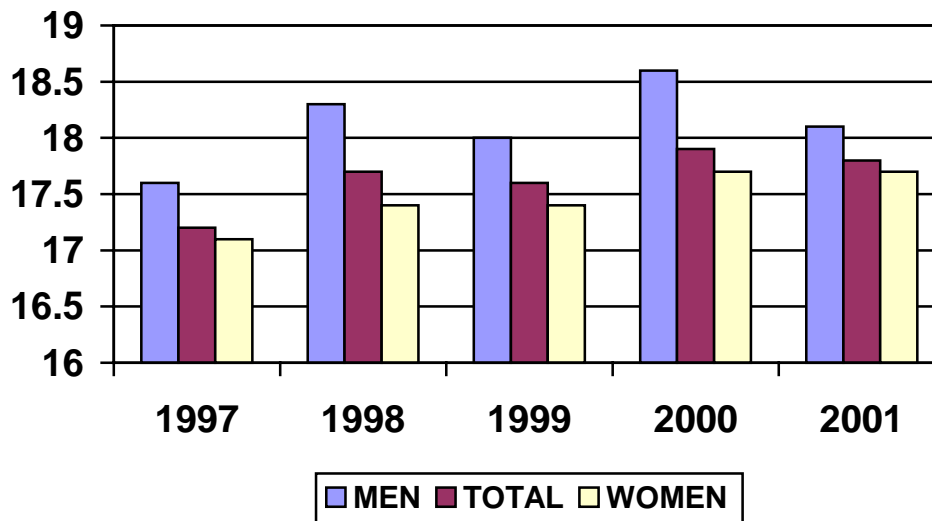

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## VI.2 General Glossary

**COHORT** - All Students who entered the university during one specific term. Cohorts are usually presented with a qualification such as first time freshmen, first time transfers and so on. The cohort First Time Freshmen, for example, would consist of all students who entered the university during a specific term, none of whom had earned any previous college level credits at any institution of higher education prior to the term of entry.

**DIRECT INSTRUCTION** "... includes activities associated with direct contact instruction of students in specific courses, supervision of student teaching and applied studies, thesis supervision, independent study and tutorials."

**DIRECT SALARY** Refers to that portion of total salary that reflects the proportion of a faculty member's total work weeks spent in direct instruction.

**FULL-TIME STUDENT** For undergraduates it is a student who has enrolled for at least 12 credit hours of courses during a single semester. A full-time graduate student is one that has enrolled for a minimum of 9 (prior to Fall 2000, full-time graduate student was one that was enrolled for a minimum of 12 credits hours) credit hours of courses during a single semester.

**GRADUATE I STUDENT LEVEL (GL1):** "Students holding *bona fide* bachelors' degrees who have been admitted to the graduate division either as a candidate for a master's degree, an advanced degree or certificate, or as an unclassified graduate student."

**HEADCOUNT:** Refers to the actual number of students enrolled at the university during a term. Headcount includes both full-time and part-time students. One headcount means one student.

**HEGIS CODES (HIGHER EDUCATION GENERAL INFORMATION SURVEY)** This term is no longer used and has been replaced by CIP (See CIP above).

**INDIRECT INSTRUCTION:** "This category includes those assigned activities which encompass duties closely related to direct instruction of students other than direct contact teaching." Examples include coaching, directing a play sponsored by the department, or writing a computer program to be used by students in next semester's classes."

**INDIRECT SALARY** Refers to that portion of total salary that reflects the proportion of a faculty member's total work weeks spent in indirect instruction.

**LOWER DIVISION STUDENT LEVEL (LD) (UNDERGRADUATE).** Students who have completed fewer than 60 semester credit hours or the equivalent.

**MAJOR (UNDERGRADUATE) at CSU** - Consists of a series of prescribed courses as a first in-depth study of a discipline in contrast to the more cursory examination of a variety of disciplines referred to as general education. The course requirements and number of hours in discipline courses required for a major are set by the university's governing board using generally accepted academic standards. Four digit numbers are assigned by the university to each major. Those numbers are unique to the university and are not the same as the numeric major codes used by the Illinois Board of Higher Education in its Cost Study and elsewhere.

**TRANSFERRED TO CSU AS FRESHMEN** - Students entering CSU for the first time having earned at least one credit but no more than 30 credits at another institution.

**TRANSFERRED TO CSU AS SOPHOMORES** - Students entering CSU for the first time having earned at least 31 credits but no more than 60 credits at another institution.

**TRANSFERRED TO CSU AS JUNIORS** - Students entering CSU for the first time having earned at least 61 credits but no more than 90 credits at another institution.

**TRANSFERRED TO CSU AS SENIORS** - Students entering CSU for the first time having earned at least 91 credits at another institution.

**UPPER DIVISION STUDENT LEVEL (UD) (UNDERGRADUATE)** Students who have completed at least 60 semester hours or unclassified (irregular or special) students who have not been admitted to the graduate division giving a post baccalaureate degree.

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### VI.3 Cost Study Glossary

**COST STUDY.** Every year since 1965 the Illinois Board of Higher Education has completed a study of costs at public universities in Illinois. This study results in the annual publication of a Discipline Unit Cost Study, Induced Course Load Matrices (Program/Major credit hour production studies [2]), and a Faculty Credit Hour Production Study.

"The three missions of public universities in Illinois are Instruction, Research and Public Service. While the organization of each university is unique in many respects, it is possible to classify the activities of each university, and therefore its costs, in terms of these three primary functions. The classification of activities and costs is based upon the responsibilities assigned to the faculty and administration."

**CIP Code.** "Classification of Instructional Programs." Numeric codes given to disciplines-four digits (See discipline) and majors (six digits) (see major in cost study) that are uniform for all public universities in Illinois. These codes are not identical to major code number designations at CSU.

**CH/SY** - See faculty load study below.

**COLLEGE COSTS (OVERHEADS)** "This category includes all administrative activities at the college level. It should include all administrative duties, and the activities of college level support personnel. Clerical and other contractual services associated with the college office would also be classified here. As was the case with departmental overheads (See departmental costs below), college level equipment and supply costs and the costs involved in administrative leaves should be included in this category."

**DEPARTMENTAL COSTS (OVERHEADS)** "Departmental overhead is the first category of support activities. As such, it represents those departmental activities that cannot be classified as direct service. It includes administrative duties and the activities of office support personnel, and other departmental contractual services. It also includes equipment and supply costs and sabbatical leave costs."

**DEPARTMENTAL RESEARCH** "This category should include research duties specifically assigned to a faculty member by the head of an academic department, or a departmental committee. Such assigned effort, which usually need not be approved by a university research committee, may contribute to professional development of a faculty member and lead to publication or other scholarly recognition. With the exception of a released time institutional contribution required by the terms of an externally (i.e., non university) funded research grant, all research effort assigned at the departmental level should be included as Departmental Research. Departmental Research should not be used as a catchall for residual faculty activities which cannot be categorized elsewhere. If there are departmental activities which cannot be categorized elsewhere, they should be included in the Departmental Overhead category. Neither Departmental Research nor Indirect Instruction can be classified as Organized Research or Public Service."

**DISCIPLINE** The smallest unit of subject-matter instruction. Each such unit, **or discipline**, has a four-digit numeric CIP code. This code is used by all higher education units within the state to represent a particular discipline. Comparisons then can be made between institutions concerning costs of instruction within a CIP code.

**DISCIPLINE COST STUDY** “Each university collects data and reports the professional activities for a given fiscal year of each faculty member, administrator and other professional staff member who has assigned time based on state appropriated funds for Instruction, Research and/or Public Service. Discipline unit costs are derived by first allocating direct salary costs among disciplines.”

“The Faculty Activity Analysis (FAA) form distributes activities of faculty and administrative employees among the three primary functions: instruction, organized research, and public service. Salaries are allocated based on the distribution of assignments shown in the FAA. Once salaries have been allocated, support costs are added, based either on the distribution of costs or student credit hours. Once all state appropriated costs have been allocated, discipline unit costs for instruction are calculated by dividing the total costs by student credit hours within each instructional level.” When a faculty member does not return an FAA form all costs associated with that member are allocated to instruction.

After all State appropriated funds have been distributed among the three primary functions and classified by cost category (eight categories from department overhead through operation and maintenance of the physical plant) instructional costs are derived by dividing costs by student credit hours generated in each instructional level within each discipline.

**FACULTY LOAD STUDY** The faculty load study, a section of the overall Cost Study, provides information on the generation of credit hours (CR HR) by faculty within a CIP discipline. (See discipline for definition).

Staff Year: Staff year is defined as the number of the faculty that worked full-time (12 months per year). Full-time is defined at CSU as accumulating 27 credit hours during an academic year. Since most faculty work nine months during a year such faculties are calculated as working 9/12 or three quarters of a calendar year. Six faculty members each working full-time (27 credit hours) for nine months would be the equivalent of four Persons working for 12 months. For example, if a normal full-time load is defined as 13.5 credit hours per semester (4.5 months) and a faculty member teaches 15 hours the first semester and 12 hours the next, 27 credit hours total, (an option available to full-time faculty) then this faculty member would represent .75 staff years.

$$\frac{9 \text{ Months} \times 27 \text{ Credit Hours}}{12 \text{ Months} \times 27 \text{ Credit Hours}} = .75 \text{ Staff years}$$

An example of derivation of credit hour per staff year (CH/SY) follows:

<u>Discipline</u>	<u>CR-HR</u>	<u>Staff-Year</u>	<u>CH/SY</u>
'Art & Design'	1346	3.49	386

After calculating the actual months during a given year that full and part-time faculty taught in this discipline, the number of persons/months was the equivalent of 3.49 faculty members that worked full time (12 months). In the example above one full-time (12 months) faculty member equivalent generated 386 CR-HR

**FTE:** Full Time Equivalent. Data under this title represent the **equivalent** of the number of students enrolled during a given term who would be taking a 'full' course load. A full-time load would be 15 hours for undergraduate students and 12 hours for graduate students. These definitions are defined by

and required in the Cost Study. The FTE is calculated by dividing the total number of credit hours (undergraduate or graduate) generated among students during a term by 15 for undergraduate level courses, and by 12 for graduate courses. FTE can be calculated by discipline, department or college. The FTE thus adjusts for students who take a full load as well as those that are part-time students.

**INDUCED COURSE LOAD MATRIX (ICLM)** This report is the third component of the Cost Study. The ICLM consists of two reports #215 and #217.

The columns of report 215 present the number of credit hours for all disciplines within the university curriculum generated by students within a specific CIP major (See “Major in Cost Study”). Each row represents the number of credit hours that students in a given major generated within a discipline. The last four columns of report 215 show the credit hours all CIP majors generated within any one CIP discipline. The credit hours generated by each discipline are summed across disciplines. The total number of credit hours by student level and across all levels generated by the university during an academic year are shown in the last cells at the end of the report.

**Interpretation:** Lower division botany students took a total of 18 credit hours in English, 32 credit hours in biology and 3 hours in physics. The remaining numbers represent credit hours in the CIP disciplines listed by students in the majors shown in the figure.

Report 217 reverses the procedure of report 215. Each column of report 217 presents a specific CIP discipline rather than CIP major. Each row represents one major. Each intersection of row and column shows the number of credit hours students who took a course or courses within a discipline generated for each major.

In the CIP discipline of philosophy 12 credit hours were taken by lower division radio/tv majors, 181 philosophy credit hours by lower division computer science majors and 24 credit hours in that discipline by English majors.

A listing of CSU majors associated with CIP majors is found in the *1998 ELECTRONIC FACT BOOK*. The Office of Institutional Research and Academic Evaluation also maintains lists showing CIP disciplines grouped under a given CIP major. Also, in the same office, a list is available showing CSU majors associated with CIP majors. Administrators interested in these lists should inquire in the IR & E Office.

**MAJOR in COST STUDY** - A series of six digit codes identifying all majors offered by any university in the State of Illinois. These codes are also referred to as CIP major codes. (See CIP above.) CIP Majors reflect one or more associated four digits coded CIP disciplines (See Discipline.) CIP disciplines also apply across all state colleges and universities. A major code for a specific university is translated into an IBHE cost study major CIP code. The association between university major and IBHE CIP major was determined by each university when the cost study was first initiated. CIP major codes do not have any course or credit hour criteria associated with them. Credit hours for a cost study CIP major are derived through the link between a university's major and the CIP major.

**ORGANIZED RESEARCH:** "Activities outside the department intended to produce one or more research outcomes including the creation of knowledge, reorganization of knowledge, and the application of knowledge...."

"Organized research may be carried out on an individual or project basis if financed from centrally administered, competitive institutional grants to individual faculty members." Research funded by non state appropriated funds are not included in the cost study."

**PUBLIC SERVICE:** Includes those program elements established to make available to the public the various unique resources and capabilities of the institution for the purpose of responding to a community need or solving a community problem. "No activity, however, should be classified and recognized as an official university activity unless it has been officially assigned by a department head, dean, vice president or president." The signature of the department chair or supervisor on the FAA signifies official recognition of the activity.



**STUDENT CREDIT HOURS:** The number of credit hours an institution awards to students based on meeting for instruction one hour per week for a semester or a laboratory meeting of two or three hours per week for a semester (about 18 weeks). Courses of other durations are prorated according to the above standards.

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
