# 4 *easy* STEPS TO REGISTER

*You must be admitted to the University before you can register for classes.*  
**Undergraduates** go to ADM 126 • **Graduates** go to ADM 126

## 1 Select your classes with your academic advisor.

*Degree seeking students will receive a Registration Advising PIN (RAP) to register on the web during advisement. • At-large students do not need a RAP to register.*

## 2 Register for classes.

Register online at [www.csu.edu](http://www.csu.edu) during the web registration. See pages 2-4, 12.

## 3 Obtain a business receipt from the Cashier (ADM 211) after validating (making payment) for your classes.

*To validate your classes means that you must make an initial down payment on your registration by the initial payment due date.*

*Your classes may be dropped if an initial payment is not received when due.*

*If your account balance is not paid in full by the final payment due date, a hold will be placed on future registration.*

*Note: Students with financial aid, tuition waivers, scholarships, or third-party payments must confirm validation with the appropriate office.*

## 4 Obtain or update your ID card in SCI 117.

*A CSU student ID card is required for all student services.*

### Tips for a Successful Web Registration

- Check your registration status for your registration date.
- If you have all the course reference numbers (CRN) for your courses, click on 'Add/Drop Classes' even if this is the first time you are registering for the selected term. The system considers each class an "add," even if it is the first class registered for the term.
- You must click on "submit classes" to secure your selections.
- Scroll down to the bottom of the screen to check for registration errors. Your schedule is not final until you have corrected all registration errors.
- You are advised to print your final schedule and confirm your registration with your instructor at first class session.
- Do not attend a class if you are not on the official course roster. Contact Registrar's Office.
- **Changes to course information may be made after the Class Schedule Bulletin is published. Check CSU X-Press for the most up-to-date course information.**

## Personal Access Code

Your first access to the secure area login requires your User ID (your University identification number, UID) and your Personal Access Code, (PAC/PIN), which is your birth date in the format of MMDDYY. *Example:* May 7, 1950 will be 050750.

The system is programmed to request you to immediately change your PAC on your first entry. Your new PAC must be six (6) characters and can be letters, numerals or a combination. Examples: AZ1234 or 135790 or KLMNOP.

You will be prompted to make up a security question and an answer on your first entry. If you forget your PAC, click the "Forgot PAC" button. Keep your PAC confidential and change it if you believe it has been compromised.

## Registration Advising Personal Identification Number, PIN (RAP)

To register online, you must have a current registration advising PIN (RAP). Degree seeking students (undergraduate and graduate) will receive a RAP from their academic advisors during the advisement session. New RAPs are assigned each term and expire at the end of the regular registration period. At-large students will not need a RAP to register online.

## Computer Locations & Help

You can use your own computer, a local library computer or a computer in the University Library. Technical support for CSU X-Press registration is available from 9a.m. - 5p.m., Monday through Friday at 773-995-3963 (IT Help Desk) or 773-995-2522 (Office of the Registrar).

## Fee Payment

Your fees must be received by the published deadline dates. If you are paying by check or credit card, please click on "on-line payment" after you have completed your registration. Students with financial aid awards or other tuition waivers must confirm their registration with a paid receipt at the Cashier's Office in ADM 211.

## Holds

You will not be able to register if there is a hold (academic or financial) placed on your record. Contact the appropriate office prior to your registration to clear your hold. Most offices are not open evenings or weekends.

- Wellness Center . . . . . for lack of immunization/records
- Registrar/Admissions . . . . . for not maintaining academic . . . . . standards

# How to Register

Spring 2012 registration will be done via CSU X-Press only.

## Instructions for Registering Online

### STEPS 1-10

1. Contact your academic advisor to obtain your current registration advising PIN (RAP).
2. On the Chicago State University home page, [www.csu.edu](http://www.csu.edu), near the top right of the page, click "A- Z". Then click "CSU X-Press." Or log in Cougar Connect and click "CSU X-Press."
3. Click "Enter Secure Area." Scroll down. In the user ID field type your University Identification Number (UID) or social security number (SSN) and in the PAC field type your date of birth (MMDDYY), then click "Login." If you have registered online before, enter the PAC you created or click "Forgot PAC" to reset your PAC.
4. Click "Student Services and Financial Aid." Then click "Registration."
5. Click "Term Selection" and select correct term (i.e., Spring 2012.) Click "Submit."
6. Click "Add/Drop Classes." You will be prompted to enter an alternate PIN. Type in the six-digit registration advising PIN (RAP) number that was given by your advisor.
7. Scroll down. Type in one five-digit course reference number (CRN) in each box for each course in which you wish to enroll. After you have typed a CRN for each course, click "Submit Changes."
8. Your courses will appear. Check to see if the subjects, course numbers and sections are correct. If all classes for which you submitted CRNs do not appear, scroll down for error messages. Correct time conflicts or closed classes by typing in another section of the course. Depending upon the error message, you may have to go back to your advisor for an override. Click "Submit Changes" again. Check to make sure all information is correct and there are no error messages. If there are no errors, scroll down to the bottom of the page and click "Complete Your Registration." Scroll down to view your charges. Print this page for your records. *If there are no charges on the page, you did not register successfully.* Go back to Add/Drop Classes and try again. Scroll down to the bottom of the page and click "Detail Schedule" and print this page for your records.
9. If you are paying by MasterCard, VISA, Discover or check, you can click "Online Payment" to pay your bill, or call the Cashier's Office at 773-995-2029, to pay by phone. Payment should be made at the time of registration.
10. If you plan to pay with cash, your payment must be received in the Cashier's Office before the deadline date noted on the Web or published in the Class Schedule Bulletin.

**NOTE:** Errors in registration transactions made using CSU X-Press are the student's responsibility. Refrain from allowing others to access your CSU X-Press account.

## Instructions for Dropping Classes on the Web

Follow instructions 1-6 for registering online. On the "Add/Drop Classes" page, click on the arrow under "Action" next to the course you wish to drop. The word NONE will be next to the arrow. Click "Drop Web." Do this for each course you wish to drop. If you wish to add a class to replace the class you are dropping, type in the five-digit Course Reference Number (CRN) of the course you wish to add in one of the boxes at the bottom of the screen and click "Submit Changes." Check for error messages.

If you have errors, click "Submit Changes" again and then type in another CRN. After you have selected your courses with no error messages, click "Complete Your Registration" at the bottom of the page.

**You may drop classes online for Spring 2012 until 5 p.m. January 25, 2012. After this date, you must submit a Change of Program/ Withdrawal form with appropriate signatures of approval.**

**NOTE: You will not be allowed to drop your last class online (resulting in zero hours of enrollment.)** You will have to submit a withdrawal form to the registrar's office, signed by all appropriate parties. For more information, contact the Office of the Registrar, ADM 128, at 773-995-2517 to have your last class dropped. A withdrawal survey must also be completed.

## Undergraduate Students

### Continuing Students

*(Those who have attended at least one term since Spring 2010)*

Currently enrolled students who have been accepted as candidates for the bachelor's degree will use the Fall 2011 RAP (registration advising PIN) given at the advisement session to register on the CSU X-Press web registration system. If you must register on campus, you must present your CSU student identification card with your advisor-signed student schedule request form in the Office of the Registrar, ADM 128.

### New Students

If you have never attended Chicago State University and you are seeking a degree, you must first be admitted. Contact the Office of Undergraduate and Graduate Admissions (ADM 126) for details. After you have been admitted, you must be advised. Your advisor will give you a Spring 2012 RAP (registration advising PIN) to use the CSU X-Press web registration system. **Spring 2012 Priority Deadline: November 15, 2011.**

### Returning Students

Undergraduates who have not attended since the Spring 2010 term and who were in good academic standing (cumulative GPA of 2.0 or higher) their last term must file an application for readmission in the Office of the Registrar, ADM 128. Undergraduates must submit transcripts covering all college courses completed at other institutions since withdrawal from Chicago State University. **Spring 2012 Priority Deadline: November 15, 2011.**

**Undergraduate students** who were dismissed from the university, or who were not in good academic standing at the end of the last term of attendance, should submit both an academic petition for reinstatement and an application for readmission to the Office of the Registrar, ADM 128. Students seeking reinstatement must submit transcripts covering all college courses completed since withdrawal. **Spring 2012 Deadline: November 15, 2011.**

**You must be advised to register.** Your advisor will give you a Spring 2012 RAP (registration advising PIN) for use with the CSU X-Press web registration. See the Quick Reference Guide for a list of departments.

## Undergraduate Students-at-Large

Students may attend the university as students-at-large in any of the following categories: (1) individuals who are regular students at a regionally accredited college or university and who can demonstrate their good academic standing at their home institution; (2) individuals who are not currently regular students at a regionally accredited college or university but who can demonstrate their good academic standing at the institution last attended; or (3) individuals enrolling at CSU as part of a special program or a cooperative agreement with another institution. Students enrolling as students-at-large in category one or two who wish to earn more than 30 credits must be admitted as regular students. Students enrolling as students-at-large in category three will abide by the guidelines established for the program or cooperative agreement. At-large students are eligible to register online through the CSU X-Press web registration system without a registration advising PIN (RAP). For more information and an undergraduate at-large application, contact the Office of Undergraduate Admissions at 773-995-2513.

## GRADUATE STUDENTS

### Continuing Students

(Those who have attended at least one term since Spring 2010)

#### **MASTER'S DEGREE CANDIDATES**

Your graduate advisor will issue your Fall 2011 RAP in your advisement session for use on the CSU X-Press web registration system.

#### **GRADUATE STUDENTS-AT-LARGE**

If necessary, you will be referred to a department for advisement and course approval. Graduate-at-large students are eligible to register online through the CSU X-Press web registration system without a RAP.

### New & Returning Students

**Master's degree candidates** attending for the first time must be advised. Your advisor will issue your Spring 2012 RAP (registration advising PIN) for use on the CSU X-Press web registration system during your advisement session.

**New graduates-at-large** who are attending for the first time must first report to the Office of Undergraduate and Graduate Admissions, ADM 126, to complete a short data form. If necessary, you will be referred to a department for advisement and course approval. You will not need a RAP to register online using the CSU X-Press web registration system.

**If you are a master's degree candidate or a student-at-large** who has not attended prior to Spring 2010, an application for readmission must be completed. Forms may be obtained in ADM 126. Master's degree candidates must obtain approval signatures for re-entry and for advisement. The Graduate School will approve the registration form for the non-degree (graduate-at-large) student to register via CSU X-Press; restricted courses will require departmental approval.

**NOTE:** Cooperating teachers eligible for tuition waivers may contact the Office of Field Placement, ED 322, 773-995-2392. Note that the proper parties must sign the waiver form before a waiver is issued. Forms must also be submitted to and signed in the provost (ADM 306) and financial aid (ADM 207) offices.

### TEACHER CERTIFICATION

If you plan to enroll for courses to achieve initial teacher certification and you have been evaluated by the Chicago Board of Education or the State of Illinois, present your deficiency statement at the College of Education Office of Teacher Certification. For more information, call 773-995-2519. All College of Education requirements for entry to teacher certification sequences must be met and appropriate departmental signatures obtained prior to enrolling in certification courses.

## UNIVERSITY EMPLOYEES

### Civil Service Staff

If you are a civil service employee enrolled in an undergraduate program, and intend to pay for tuition with a Civil Service Waiver, please be informed that you may be eligible for financial aid. Please complete and submit a Free Application for Federal Student Aid to the U.S. Department of Education, and complete the financial aid application process.

If you need assistance completing the financial aid documents, contact the Educational Opportunity Center/Project Success, DH 132 at 773-995-2371. To take tuition-free courses, the application for civil service employee education benefits must be completed, approved by your supervisor, and sent to the Office of Human Resources, ADM 203. Applications are available in ADM 203.

All university employees not possessing a bachelor's degree are limited to a maximum of thirty (30) semester hours of course work prior to their formal admission to the university.

University employees must adhere to the same academic regulations as other students at the university.

### Faculty and Administrators

To take tuition-free courses, employees must receive written approval from their chairperson or supervisor and college dean, where appropriate, indicating the course(s) for enrollment. The written approval then must be submitted to the provost, ADM 306. The program identification code for faculty and administrators who are not seeking a degree is GSAL. All University employees are subject to the rules and regulations set forth by Chicago State University regarding education benefits for employees.

### Tuition Waiver Applicants

Eligible employees and cooperating teachers requesting tuition waivers must present applications to the Office of Financial Aid, ADM 207, with all appropriate signatures by September 15, for the fall term, January 30 for the Spring term and by the first day of classes for any intersession or summer session in which the waiver is presented and the individual enrolls.

The tuition waiver is to be applied toward the term in which the course is taken, which means waiver applications are to be submitted for each term of enrollment. Waivers do not cover past due bills and will not be accepted after the deadline date.

## ADVISEMENT

All degree-seeking students are **REQUIRED** to be advised prior to their registration. Advisors will give a RAP to a student during the advisement session to use with the CSU X-Press web registration system.

**Special undergraduate students-at-large (USAL)** do not need advisement and are eligible to register through the CSU X-Press web registration system without a registration advising PIN (RAP). Master's degree candidates and graduate certificate students must be advised by the department supervising the program to which they have been admitted. RAPs are distributed by graduate advisors.

**Graduate-at-large students (GSAL, GSUM)** do not need advisement and are eligible to register through the CSU X-Press web registration system without a RAP. However, special permission is required for at-large students to enroll in some 5000-level or higher graduate courses. Students registering online must obtain the academic department's approval prior to attempting to register for these or any other restricted course. Students should not attempt to register for two different sections of the same course. If additional work is desired in a variable credit course, students should talk with the department chairperson.

Graduate-at-large students may enroll in graduate level courses by obtaining permission from the academic department supervising the courses prior to attempting course registration. Restrictions or safeguards are built into the registration system that prevent registration in these courses by students-at-large. Students at-large who wish to enroll for graduate courses should first check with graduate advisors or chairpersons to have these restrictions lifted prior to registration. Graduate-at-large students may enroll in graduate level courses by obtaining permission from the academic department supervising the courses prior to attempting course registration. Restrictions or safeguards are built into the registration system that prevent registration in these courses by students-at-large. Students at-large who wish to enroll for graduate courses should first check with graduate advisors or chairpersons to have these restrictions lifted prior to registration.

*Students should note that the time for advisement is not during registration. To speed up your registration, have your schedule prepared with alternative courses to take, if certain courses are closed.*

## Student Registration Responsibility

If an admitted student presents unofficial transcripts as a basis for advising, the student is responsible for any consequences related to course selection, registration and academic progress based upon the unofficial transcripts.

It is the responsibility of each student to enter the proper course reference number (CRN) for all registration transactions. A student should only register for advised courses. Abuse of the web registration system may result in your courses being dropped by request of the department or the instructor of the course.

A student is responsible for his/her registration transactions made via CSU X-Press and official registration forms. While students are required to seek advisement prior to registration (add, drop or total withdrawal of

courses), it is the student's responsibility, (NOT the advisor's) to enter registration transactions via CSU X-Press using a student's UID and PAC.

Students should not share their CSU X-Press password/PAC with anyone, including faculty and staff. Students should reset their passwords if they feel their password has been compromised.

A student is responsible for dropping/withdrawing courses that he/she has no intent to attend or has stopped attending. Instructors **MAY** issue grades WN (Withdrawn-Never attended) for students who miss the first two sessions of a course (equivalent to the first two hours). If a student stops attending a class and does not withdraw from the course, the instructor may request to have the student withdrawn or issue a failing grade. However, it is **NOT** the responsibility of the University to withdraw students from courses for nonattendance. **See Class Attendance Policy.**

Students are responsible for obtaining a receipt for payment on your account by the published payment due dates, even if your account is being paid through a grant, scholarship, loan or another party. You must confirm your registration with a paid receipt from the cashier's office, ADM 211.

Students are responsible for confirming registration in all courses with each instructor during the first class session. If your name does not appear on the roster, contact the Office of the Registrar (ADM 128). **Students are not allowed to sit/participate in a class for which they are not officially registered.**

## STUDENT REGISTRATION AGREEMENT

By registering for classes at the Chicago State University (CSU), the student promises to pay all assessed tuition and fees as a result of Spring 2012 registration, unless he/she withdraws the registration on or before January 25, 2012 (deadline for 100% reversal of tuition and fees). The student also promises to pay any additional charges incurred including but not limited to charges for room and board, parking, class materials, and any other departmental or college charges.

The University is advancing value to each student in the form of educational services and a student's right to register is expressly conditioned upon the student's agreement to pay the costs of tuition and fees and any additional costs when those charges become due. Regardless of eligibility for financial aid, the student is personally responsible for the full amount assessed as a result of registration and attendance. If a student fails to pay his/her debt in full on the date specified on the billing statement (E-Bill), he/she will be assessed late payment charges in accordance to University policy. The University may refer a past due account for collection and may authorize legal actions against a student for the collect of the debt. The student is liable for all reasonable collection costs, including attorney fees, court costs, and other charges necessary for the collection of a past due account. **See Payment Policy for more information.**

## Advance Registration / November 14 - 30 (via CSU X-Press) • 7 a.m.-10 p.m.

All students who register via CSU X-Press November 14 - 30, including students with financial assistance, must make an initial payment by December 2, 2011. Students are to register according to their student classification. Please refer to the web registration calendar above to determine the time frame you are to register on CSU X-Press.

If you are unsure of your student classification, please refer to your unofficial transcript on CSU X-Press or contact your academic advisor for assistance. Undergraduate student classification is calculated by the number of credit hours earned. Credit hours currently enrolled are not calculated in your student classification.

**Students are strongly advised to make an appointment with their advisors prior to registering or changing programs.**

## Regular Registration/ Change of Schedule Period December 1 – January 16 • 7 a.m. - 10 p.m.

All students, including students with financial assistance, must make an initial payment at the time of registration. New and continuing students who did not advance-enroll may register via CSU X-Press according to the registration schedule.

A registration advising PIN (RAP) may be obtained from academic advisors. Students who advance-enrolled for the Spring 2012 semester may change their programs via CSU X-Press by dropping or adding classes according to the registration calendar. Drop/Add forms are available from the academic department offices.

You may only add classes that are open or become available. **You will not be allowed to drop your last class online (resulting in zero hours of enrollment).** You will have to submit a withdrawal form to the registrar's office, signed by all appropriate parties. For more information, contact the Office of the Registrar, ADM 128, at 773-995-2517 to have your last class dropped. A withdrawal survey must also be completed.

## Late Registration / Change of Schedule Period January 17 - 18 • 7 a.m. - 10 p.m.

All students, including students with financial assistance, must make an initial payment at the time of registration. A \$100 late registration fee will be charged for initial registrations after January 16, 2012. Late registration and late change of program will end at 10 p.m. on January 18, 2012. The late registration fee is nonrefundable.

**Drop a Course(s):** A student can drop a course(s) on CSU X-Press after the late change of program period until Wednesday, January 25, 2012. After January 25, 2012, students must receive approval from an academic advisor and other administrators as appropriate for dropped courses on their change of program form. Withdrawal from a course is not complete until the form is submitted to the Office of the Registrar, ADM 128, and approved by a records and registration staff member. Errors in the completion of the change of program form are the student's responsibility.

**NOTE: Students who reduce their credit hour load below 12 semester hours by January 25, 2012 are eligible for a partial reversal of charges.**

**NOTE: You will not be allowed to drop your last class online (resulting in zero hours of enrollment).** You will have to submit a withdrawal form to the registrar's office, signed by all appropriate parties. For more information, contact the Office of the Registrar, ADM 128, at 773-995-2517 to have your last class dropped. A withdrawal survey must also be completed.

**F-1 international students** are REQUIRED to receive authorization from the Office of International Programs' designated school official BEFORE dropping a course that will reduce the F-1 student's credit hour load below 12 semester hours.

**Student athletes** are REQUIRED to receive authorization from the Director of Athletics and the faculty athletic representative BEFORE dropping a course that will reduce the student athlete's credit hour load below 12 semester hours.

**NOTE: You will not be allowed to drop your last class online (resulting in zero hours of enrollment).** You will have to submit a withdrawal form to the registrar's office, signed by all appropriate parties. For more information, contact the Office of the Registrar, ADM 128, at 773-995-2517 to have your last class dropped. A withdrawal survey must also be completed.

## Academic Regulations

### Academic Progression Policy

A student who has not successfully completed the academic skills requirements will have hold(s) placed on his/her record that will remain until the specified requirements have been met.

### Academic Skills Courses & Placement Assessment

**Freshmen:** Once accepted for admission to Chicago State University, all freshmen must take the University diagnostic examinations in English, mathematics, and reading by the end of the first term in residence. All freshmen must either meet the minimal requirements of the University diagnostic examinations or pass the appropriate academic skills course, namely English 1230, Reading 1500, or Math 0990. To exit from these courses, students must pass the appropriate examination.

**Transfer Students:** Transfer students who have not completed an associate's degree (A.A. degree or A.S. degree) must take proficiency examinations in English and reading. Transfer students who transfer general education math courses with a C or better and whose majors do not require additional mathematics courses do not have to take the proficiency examination in mathematics. Transfer students who do not transfer general education math or who are required by their majors to take more math must take the proficiency examinations in mathematics.

Transfer students who have earned an associate's degree (A.A. degree or A.S. degree) or who have completed sixty 60 hours or more from a combination of two-year and four-year institutions, and who have completed the Illinois General Education Core, are not required to take the proficiency examinations in English, reading or math unless they are required as a prerequisites for other courses.

## Academic Petition Policy

**Effective Summer 2011: Academic petitions for any term prior to Fall 2011 must be submitted by October 5, 2011.**

**Academic petitions that apply to the Fall 2011 term must be submitted to the Office of the Registrar by 5pm February 10, 2012.**

Academic policies and procedures are the building blocks of all academic planning at Chicago State University. All students are expected to be familiar with University policies. Knowing these policies and referencing them on a regular basis allows students, faculty, staff, and administrators the ability to operate under the same set of expectations as all parties work together to achieve the best possible student experience.

Exceptions to policy may be requested in writing and delivered to the Office of the Registrar using the Academic Petition form. Requests for exceptions are to be clearly written and expected to include a detailed explanation about why the student believes an exception is warranted, required appropriate signatures, and attached supporting documentation where applicable.

Students can petition for administrative withdrawal or other registration modifications due to extenuating circumstances within 60 days of the term's end date. With each petition, students are required to submit evidence of the circumstance and proof of attendance/grade from each instructor.

Students can petition for an extension of the deadline to remove an Incomplete ("I" grade) for a period not to exceed one additional semester. The petition must include written consent of the instructor of record as well as the extension deadline date. In addition, a petition for an extension must be submitted 30 days prior to the final date of completion as listed on the Incomplete Grade Request and Contract form.

Students can petition for reinstatement after one full semester of dismissal for not maintaining academic standards. The student must present the request for reinstatement using the academic petition form and must include written consent of the college dean or designee. All petitions for reinstatement must be filed by the following dates: Fall term: July 15; Spring term: November 15; Summer term: May 1.

All academic petitions submitted to the Office of the Registrar are reviewed within sixty (60) days of receipt by the Academic Petition Committee. Students will receive notification of a decision within 30 days of the review. Decisions rendered by the Academic Petition Committee are final.

## Cancelled Classes

The University reserves the right to limit the size of classes and to cancel classes for which there is insufficient enrollment. Class cancellations are usually made before the first day of class for the term. If the class for which you are registered is cancelled, you will automatically be dropped from the class. If you do not register for an alternative class, a tuition refund will be processed to your account according to the refund policy. Students receiving financial aid benefits may wish to consult with their financial aid counselor concerning any award implications.

## Class Attendance

Students are expected to attend all class sessions in the course sections for which they are registered unless prevented by illness, an official University activity, or other urgent and unavoidable reasons. The responsibility for maintaining class attendance records rests with each faculty member. Students are expected to consult with instructors to complete class work and all assignments when classes are missed.

### *The following is the University policy on class attendance:*

- An instructor may drop students who do not attend the first day of class and make no attempt to contact the instructor or department chairperson prior to the absence. The instructor may report students who do not attend the first two weeks of class without evidence of a legitimate excuse to the registrar who will drop the student from the class.
- Instructors are required to monitor and keep records of the attendance of students at all class meetings. **If a student's total absences are equal to or exceed the equivalent of two weeks of instruction, the instructor may drop the student from the course with a grade of W by February 14.** See *Withdrawal from the University* for more information.
- To drop or withdraw from courses, the student must use the drop/withdrawal form, have an advisor sign it, and then submit the form to the Office of the Registrar.
- **If a student stops attending a class but fails to officially withdraw from the class before the drop/withdrawal date, the result may be a failing grade. Although the instructor may drop a student for poor attendance, it is ultimately the student's responsibility to withdraw.** See *Withdrawal from the University* for more information.
- **If a student stops attending a class but fails to officially withdraw from the class before the drop/withdrawal date, the student is still responsible for the tuition and fees assessed.** See Spring 2012 Academic Calendar for drop/withdrawal deadline dates.

Confirm your registration in each course by reviewing your class schedule on CSU X-Press. If you are informed by the instructor and department representative that your name does not appear on the official preliminary and/or subsequent class rosters, it is your responsibility to investigate the matter immediately by contacting the Office of Records and Registration, ADM 128, at 773-995-2517.

## Credit Hour Load

### **UNDERGRADUATE STUDENTS:**

The maximum credit hour load for the Fall and Spring semesters is 16 credit hours. Students whose CSU cumulative grade point average is 3.0 or better may register for a program of 18 semester hours. Additional hours beyond 16 must be approved in writing by the academic department. The Office of the Registrar must record that approval in the system.

Although there is no minimum credit-hour load for students, the following minimum credit-hour loads are recommended: Veterans receiving benefits under Public Law 89-358 (Veterans Re-adjustments Benefits Act of 1966) must carry 12 credit hours to be eligible for full subsistence allowances during the semester. Students may not be registered at other colleges without written permission from the Academic Evaluation and Advisement Office, ADM 128. This permission **MUST** be obtained prior to registration at either college.

**F-1 international students** must carry a minimum of 12 hours during fall and spring terms to maintain lawful F-1 student status in the United States.

**GRADUATE STUDENTS:** The maximum credit hour load of graduate courses is 12 hours in the Fall and Spring semesters. Exceptions to the graduate course credit hour load may be made with the approval of the graduate faculty advisors and/or the department chairperson and the graduate dean. Students may not be registered at other colleges and universities without approval of their advisors and the graduate dean. Permission must be obtained prior to registration at either college.

## Undergraduate Incomplete Grade Policy

An undergraduate student may request a grade of Incomplete (I) in a non-academic skills course if extraordinary and unavoidable circumstances have prevented completion of the required course work. By requesting an Incomplete, the student agrees to complete of the required course work in accordance to the Incomplete (I) Grade Request & Contract form. If a student does not complete the course work by the specified date, the grade of "I" will be replaced by the default grade as stated in the contract.

A request for a grade of Incomplete must be initiated by the student and submitted in writing using the Incomplete (I) Grade Request & Contract form. The contract must be submitted to the Office of the Registrar by May 15, 2012. Contracts submitted after this deadline may not be processed and result in the default grade of F.

The Incomplete (I) Grade Request & Contract form can be obtained in the Office of the Registrar, ADM 128. The form is also available online at [www.csu.edu/RecordsandRegistration/](http://www.csu.edu/RecordsandRegistration/) or at [www.csu.edu/coursebulletin/](http://www.csu.edu/coursebulletin/).

Students DO NOT have to re-register for a course for which they have a grade of incomplete (I). If, after the incomplete contract has expired and/or a change of grade has been issued to replace the "I", a student may register for the course again. See Repeat Policy.

## Placement Assessment • ADM 126

Students must have a picture ID to take the placement assessment. The assessment placement schedule is posted in the office, as well as on the examination office web site at [www.csu.edu/examinations/](http://www.csu.edu/examinations/).

## Prerequisites

Prerequisites are listed in the university catalog at [www.csu.edu/catalogs](http://www.csu.edu/catalogs). A student should not attempt to register for a course unless she/he meets the prerequisites, if any, for the course. If a student does not meet the prerequisite for a course, the student may be dropped from the course. Please consult your academic advisor about prerequisites for your courses.

## Sexual Assault Prevention Online Education Program

All incoming students who entered CSU during the spring of 2009 or after are required to complete the Student Success Sexual Assault Prevention Program online education program. If you have a Sexual Assault hold (XS) on your account, you must complete the online training program prior to registering for classes. It is critical that you complete this program to avoid being blocked from registering for classes, requesting transcripts, and viewing your grades on CSU X-Press.

### Program Instructions

1. The online program is available to you at this link: <https://studentsuccess.org/csu0911-sexualassault/index.php>. You may access this link from any computer with internet access.
2. Under "New Users" enter the following access code: 1190278.
3. Follow the instructions provided to take the program. You will be asked to input an email address and password. Put in your CSU email address and your CSU password.
4. Completing the training requires successful completing of fourteen (14) modules. You may stop and restart the program as many times as you want. You do not have to complete the whole program in one sitting.
5. Present a copy of the Student Success Sexual Assault Prevention Program's progress report to the Office of Admissions in ADM 126/127 to verify completion.

If at any time you need to speak to a trained professional about any of the topics addressed in the program, please contact the CSU Counseling Center at 773-995-2383.

## Undergraduate Repeat Policy

Students are allowed to repeat a course and have the highest grade earned count toward their cumulative grade point average. Please note that certain financial aid programs may not cover tuition for repeated courses. Students should contact a financial aid advisor when attempting to repeat a course, to determine eligibility.

## Withdrawal from the University

(Drop/withdraw from all courses resulting in zero hours of enrollment)

Prior to requesting to formally withdraw from the University, students are strongly encouraged to seek guidance from an academic advisor, major department chairperson, college dean, or from the Office of the Registrar (ADM 128)/ Enrollment Management (ADM 129) for a more suitable resolution to concerns affecting enrollment.

Students who fully withdraw from the university by January 25, 2012 are eligible for a total reversal of tuition and fees. Students are permitted to withdraw from the university with a grade of W on their transcripts until Friday, May 4, 2012, after completing a Change of Program/Withdrawal form. The completed form must include all appropriate signatures and be submitted to the Office of the Registrar by 5pm on May 4, 2012.

Students who fully withdraw from the university at any time from January 26 through February 14 are eligible for a 50% reversal of the refundable tuition and fees.

**No refunds will be issued for total withdrawals made after February 14, 2012.**

A withdrawal from the University is not complete until the appropriate form is submitted, approved and processed by the Office of the Registrar.

**Students who withdraw must also complete a withdrawal survey when they submit their withdrawal form to the Office of the Registrar, ADM 128.** Withdrawal forms should be submitted in person by the student so that the survey can be completed.

**Errors in the information provided on registration/withdrawal forms are the student's responsibility.**

**Students can request to drop or withdraw from a course January 26 through May 4, 2012.** It is the student's responsibility to submit the completed and properly signed form to the Office of the Registrar, ADM 128, no later than 5pm, May 4, 2012. Forms submitted after May 4 will not be accepted.

Students who do not opt to drop or withdraw from a course or courses prior to the start of the final examination period (May 7 - May 12) will receive a final grade of A, B, C, D, I, P, or F as issued by the instructor.

# Additional Information

## Americans with Disabilities Act

Chicago State University is strongly committed to complying with Sections 503 and 504 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973, as amended, and the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) of 1990. It is also committed to assuring that no qualified individual is, by reason of a disability, excluded from participation in or denied the benefits of any services, programs, or activities provided by the University.

## Address / Telephone Change

Students are required to change their address or telephone numbers using the CSU X-Press Web system or to submit a Change of Address/Telephone form in the Office of the Registrar, ADM 128, to ensure receipt of billing statements and other important communications from the University. The University will not accept responsibility for misdirected mail.

## Policy on Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act of 1974 (Notification to Students)

Chicago State University, in full compliance with the Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act of 1974, shall make educational records available to students upon request. Likewise, in accordance with the law, individually identifiable educational records will not be released to other than authorized individuals without written consent of the student.

Students have the right to file complaints with the Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act Office (FERPA) concerning alleged failures by the institution to comply with the Act.

The Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act (FERPA) affords students certain rights with respect to their education records. These rights include:

1. The right to inspect and review their education records within 45 days of the day the University receives a request for access. Students should submit to the Registrar, dean, or other appropriate official,

written requests that identify the record(s) they wish to inspect. The University official will make arrangements for access and notify the student of the time and place where the records may be inspected. If the records are not maintained by the University official to whom the request was submitted, that official shall advise the student of the correct official to whom the request should be addressed.

2. The right to request the amendment of the student's education records that the student believes are inaccurate or misleading. Students may ask the University to amend a record that they believe is inaccurate or misleading. They should write the University official responsible for the record, clearly identify the part of the record they want changed, and specify why it is inaccurate or misleading. If the University decides not to amend the record as requested by the student, the University will notify the student of the decision and advise the student of his or her right to a hearing regarding the request for amendment. Additional information regarding the hearing procedures will be provided to the student when notified of the right to a hearing.
3. The right to consent to disclosures of personally identifiable information contained in the student's education records, except to the extent that FERPA authorizes disclosure without consent. One exception which permits disclosure without consent is disclosure to school officials with legitimate educational interests. A school official is a person employed by the University in an administrative, supervisory, academic or research, or support staff position (including law enforcement unit personnel and health staff); a person or company with whom the University has contracted (such as an attorney, auditor, collection agent or other service provider - such as the National Student Clearinghouse; a person serving on the Board of Trustees; or a student serving on an official committee, such as a disciplinary or grievance committee, or assisting another school official in performing his or her tasks. A school official has a legitimate educational interest if the official needs to review an education record in order to fulfill his or her professional responsibility. Upon request, the University may disclose education records without consent to another school in which a student seeks or intends to enroll.
4. The right to file a complaint with the U.S. Department of Education concerning alleged failures by State University to comply with the requirements by FERPA.

## Directory Information

Chicago State University considers the following categories to be directory information, and, as such, may release it to any or all inquirers in such forms as directories or computer address lists:

1. the student's name,
2. dates of attendance,
3. full- or part-time status,
4. degrees and awards received,
5. honors received (including Dean's List),
6. for members of athletic teams, weight and height.

Students who do not wish this information to be released may prevent such release by sending a written request to the Registrar.



## Distance Learning / E-Learning • LIB 318

**Hardware and software requirements:** For online courses, you will need access to a personal computer with Windows (2000, ME, XP); Microsoft Office 2003 (Word, Excel and Power Point); Pentium 4 or faster processor; at least 512 megabytes of memory (RAM) and internet access. Broadband is preferable.

**A web or online course** is led by an instructor using a web browser to access a course management system for synchronous and asynchronous instruction and assessment. Some examinations may be proctored and must be taken on campus or at another mutually agreed location.

**A hybrid course** is led by an instructor using a web browser to access a course management system for asynchronous instruction where some course sessions are scheduled on campus or at other designated locations, as listed in the comments section below the course listing.

**Registration Requirements:** During or before registration students MUST consult with an advisor regarding admittance to WEB and HYBRID courses. You MUST also have some experience with navigating the Internet and using it as research tool and communication resource.

**To take an online course,** students must have an active CSU e-mail account from the Information Technology Division.

A distance learning fee of \$50 per course will be assessed to a student's account upon registration in any hybrid or online/web course, including contract and extension courses.

## E-mail Accounts • LIB 143

An e-mail account is provided to each student who has registered for at least one semester. To obtain your e-mail account information, you will need to complete an account request form in the Information Technology Computer Lab, LIB 143. For security purposes, account information may not be provided by telephone. For further information, contact the ITD help desk at 773-995-3963.

If you need official verification of your attendance or academic record, you may submit an enrollment verification request or transcript request to the Office of the Registrar, ADM 128. Remember, you will not receive a copy of your grades by mail. If you need assistance using CSU X-Press, stop by the Office of the Registrar, or call 773-995-2522.

NOTE: Students should not share their CSU X-Press password/PAC with anyone, including faculty and staff. Students should reset their passwords if they feel their password has been compromised.

## Graduation Applications

**BACHELOR'S DEGREE CANDIDATES** must submit graduation applications to the academic advisor by Thursday, February 9, 2012. The deadline for filing your advisor-signed application for Spring 2012 in the Office of Evaluation & Advisement, ADM 128 is **Thursday, February 16, 2012**. **MASTER'S DEGREE CANDIDATES** may obtain a graduation application from the Office of Undergraduate and Graduate Admissions (ADM 126). Signatures are required for all students. Students obtaining certification with their program must obtain the departmental stamp from the Office of Teacher Certification, ED 208 as well. The deadline for filing your Spring 2012 graduation application is **Thursday, February 16, 2012**.

*Please note that the graduate graduation application fee is \$25.00. This fee is separate from the cap and gown fee or any other costs associated with commencement. The commencement date for Spring 2012 is May 17, 2012.*

## Immunization Requirement

Illinois Public Health Act Administrative Code Part 694 specifies that any enrolled student born on or after January 1, 1957, who is a first time freshman, a transfer student, or reentering a university after an absence of more than one semester, will be required to show proof of immunity to measles, mumps, rubella, diphtheria and tetanus prior to registration. Any student who has not yet complied must comply with this mandate. Evidence of immunity from these diseases is required for students. A registered health care provider must verify documentation of immunization and testing. A high school health record with proof of immunization, if properly noted and certified, is acceptable documentation for residents of Illinois. Individuals who are not properly immunized will not be allowed to register. Proof of proper immunization must be on file prior to registration. Students who fail to comply with the immunization requirements will be assessed a \$25.00 non-compliance fee.

**Evidence of tuberculin testing** is required for all international and residence hall students, as well as students in programs that require proof of immunizations (e.g., health programs and education).

**Students who need to obtain immunizations** or information regarding immunizations may contact their primary care providers or their local public health clinic. Students who reside outside of Chicago should contact the public health clinic of their townships or counties.

**Students who wish to prove immunization requirements** must complete the student immunization form and send it to: Wellness/Health Center, Chicago State University, 9501 S. King Drive, ADM 131, Chicago, Illinois 60628. Students can call the Wellness Center at 773-995-2010.

## Parking

## Student Identification Card Policy

All full-time and part-time students enrolled at Chicago State University are required to obtain an official CSU photo identification card. The card should be kept in their possession while on campus or attending functions and classes at CSU. A valid CSU ID card is required to use all university facilities, including the library and the computer center. In addition, it is required to obtain free or reduced admission to university events. This card must be presented on demand for official university identification. There is a \$20 ID replacement fee. University ID cards can be obtained in the CougarOne lab, SCI 117. ## Student University Identification Number (UID)

To comply with the Family Education Rights and Privacy Act of 1974, a University Identification Number (UID) is issued to each student and employee of the University. Students are issued a UID approximately 24 hours after their initial registration with the University. The UID is found on the University identification card. The unique UID may be used through the lifetime of an individual's relationship with CSU.

To secure students' social security numbers, the UID should be used in all forms of communication whenever possible. Please include the student's nine-digit UID (9## - ## - #####) on all forms and email correspondence instead of the social security number.

## Transcripts/Enrollment Verifications

Transcripts requested to be mailed are \$5 per copy. Transcripts requested via the internet are \$7.50 per copy. Transcripts requested over the counter for immediate receipt are \$10 per copy. Enrollment verifications are \$4 per copy, except for issuance governmental agencies. No fee will be charged for enrollment verifications issued to: the Department of Human Services; federal government agencies; banks; child care services and subsidized housing services. A pickup service is not available for enrollment verifications.

## **Health Insurance is Mandatory**

Chicago State University provides a mandatory Injury and Sickness Insurance Plan underwritten by United Healthcare Insurance Company. All full-time students (undergraduates enrolled in 12 hours or more, graduates enrolled in 9 hours or more, and doctoral students enrolled in 6 hours or more) are automatically charged for the plan. All full time international students are required to purchase this insurance plan for the school year. The fee is applied to the accounts of full time students enrolled in all on-campus courses or a combination of off-campus (Extension/online) and on-campus courses.

## **Waiver/Enrollment Process and Deadline**

Students must complete an online form to waive out of or enroll into the mandatory CSU insurance plan every fall and spring semester.

**To Waive:** Students who have health insurance coverage are able to cancel the mandatory health insurance plan by going online during the specified waiver/enrollment period and completing the waiver form provided there.

**To Enroll:** Students who do not have insurance or simply want to keep the mandatory health insurance plan must go online to complete and submit an enrollment form. Submitting an enrollment form will expedite activation of your enrollment should you need access to insurance coverage before the university submits its final list of students who are to be insured. The period of coverage will be January 5, 2012 through August 18, 2012.

**Students Who Take No Action:** Any student who does not submit an online waiver by the announced deadline will be required to buy the university insurance plan. Waiver/enrollment periods and deadlines are published below as well as in the academic calendar each semester.

**Waiver/Enrollment Period and Deadlines:** The waiver/enrollment period for the Spring 2012 semester will open on November 21, 2011. The deadline for submitting a waiver or enrollment form will be 12:00 midnight on January 20, 2012.

## **Part-Time Students, Spouses and Dependents Eligible for Coverage**

Part-time students enrolled in 6-11 credit hours may participate in the university provided plan on a voluntary basis. Part-time and full-time students who are insured in the plan may insure their eligible dependents and domestic partners on a voluntary basis. The enrollment period, deadline, and period of coverage are the same as those for CSU students.

## Calculate Your Tuition

This formula shows how to tabulate your tuition charges:

- On Campus: Total number of credit hours selected x tuition per credit hour + fees applicable to your total credit hours = your tuition.
- Off Campus: Total number of credit hours selected x tuition per credit hour + fees applicable to your total credit hours = your tuition.
- Distance Learning: Total number of credit hours selected x tuition per credit hour + \$50 distance learning fee = your tuition.

**NOTE: Some courses carry additional fees. These fees are not included in the tuition and mandatory fee information. The list of courses with additional fees is in the back of this bulletin.**

## E-Bills

What is an E-Bill? An E-Bill is the electronic version of your monthly statement. E-Bills are snapshots of the information contained on your student financial account. Your student account includes all charges and payments, financial aid, and other credits. The charges you will find on your account include, but is not limited to, tuition, health insurance, room and board, and other related fees. All charges are subject to change as you make changes to your living arrangements, course schedule, and other related charges might change either before or after you receive your initial E-Bill for the term.

Chicago State University does not issue paper statements/bills. E-Bills are issued monthly throughout the term of enrollment. All charges incurred for the term are due by the published final payment due date. All past due balances are subject to additional collection fees if unpaid.

Online Account Access: You can access/view your financial account information online through CSU X-Press. E-Bills are posted onto CSU X-Press monthly. When a new E-Bill/statement is available, you will receive an e-mail notification to your CSU e-mail address.

## Four-Year Guaranteed Tuition Plan

The "Truth in Tuition" bill mandates that Illinois public universities provide four years of level tuition for new students enrolling for the first time beginning with the Fall 2004-2005 academic year. Undergraduate and transfer students enrolling at CSU for the first time after Fall 2004 and students who enroll for the first time every semester beginning Fall 2004-2005 and thereafter will maintain the same tuition rate for four consecutive years, or until the student reaches 120 credit hours. The hours will be extended to accommodate any majors or programs that exceed the 120 hours or four years. The guaranteed rate will remain in effect, except in the event of a break in enrollment of more than one year (two semesters, excluding summer school). In no case will the initial guaranteed rate be valid beyond five years of total enrollment. A tuition surcharge of 10% will be assessed for students who extend beyond the four-year guarantee period (120 credit hours) or five years of total enrollment. For all other students, CSU's current tuition program will remain in effect.

**IMPORTANT NOTE:** A change in major will not affect the guaranteed rate. That rate will continue for the number of credit hours necessary to complete the new major, not to exceed five years of total enrollment. Beyond five years of total enrollment, a 10% surcharge will be assessed.

**Extended illness and military service** will be given special consideration. The rate guarantee will be extended on a case-by-case basis through the student appeal process.

**Transfer student** rates will be guaranteed based upon 120 credit hours less the number of credits transferred at the time of first enrollment. All extensions and exceptions that apply to new freshmen will be extended to new transfer students.

**Credit hour pricing** / Beginning with the Fall 2004-2005 academic year, tuition and mandatory fees will be charged on a per credit hour basis up to 15 hours. This 15 credit hour cap will allow students to complete 120 credit hours in eight semesters or four years. Credit hours exceeding 15 will be charged at the rate for 15 credit hours.

**Out-of-state tuition** / The Four Year Guaranteed Tuition Plan is extended to all undergraduate out-of-state new freshmen and transfer students whose permanent residence is not within the state of Illinois.

**In - State tuition** / The Four Year Guaranteed Tuition Plan is extended to all undergraduate new freshmen and transfer students whose permanent residence is within the state of Illinois.

Effective Fall 2010, newly admitted students whose state of permanent residency is Indiana, Iowa, Kentucky, Missouri or Wisconsin are extended in-state tuition rates at Chicago State University.

## Mandatory Fees

Mandatory fees apply to all on-campus students and students with a combination off-campus and on-campus schedules regardless of student level or residency status.

Any combination of extension or distance learning courses and on-campus courses will have mandatory fees charged.

## Payment and Refund Policy

By registering for classes at the Chicago State University (CSU), you acknowledge financial responsibility for the confirmed courses resulting from this registration, and all fees assessed to your student account (including the student health insurance fee). You also accept responsibility for any additional costs related to your enrollment at CSU including, but not limited to, room, board, parking, library fines, books and other class materials and any other departmental or college charges. By enrolling, you acknowledge that you are receiving an educational benefit from CSU, and that the costs associated with that benefit are an extension of credit from the University which is due and payable upon the date specified (final payment due date). Tuition and fee charges are billed on a monthly basis.

CSU does not mail billing statements to students. If you are a currently enrolled student, you will receive e-mail notification each month, at your university e-mail address, indicating your tuition and fee statements are available online. The online statement, called the E-Bill, allows you to see your charges in an easy-to read, user- friendly format.

Student account balances are expected to be paid in full by the final payment due date each term. These charges, in accordance with CSU Policy, apply to all customers billed through the Student Accounts Receivable system, and are subject to a LATE PAYMENT CHARGE of \$25.00 when the full amount is not paid when the final payment is due. Such accounts will also be assessed a PENALTY of \$40.00 IN ADDITION to the LATE PAYMENT CHARGE when the account balance becomes past due (delinquent). A financial hold will be placed on any delinquent student account. This hold will prevent registration, release of transcripts, and may also prevent graduation and the release of a diploma.

In addition, you understand that Chicago State University may refer your past due account for collection and may authorize legal action against you for the collection of this debt. You agree to be liable for all reasonable collection costs, including attorney fees, court costs, and other charges necessary for the collection of your past due account. You understand that if you allow your account to go into delinquent status, your registration, release of your transcript and diploma will be prohibited until such time as your account is paid in full.

No registration transaction is complete until the business office has processed the transaction and the student has been issued a printed receipt. If you register online, please confirm your registration by obtaining a paid receipt for your registration at the cashier's office. All students registered for Fall 2011 must obtain a receipt for their first installment.

1. **Students must have met all their financial obligations** to the University before they are eligible to register for classes unless payment arrangements for meeting such obligations have been made with the bursar.
2. **Discover, MasterCard, Telecheck, VISA**, cash, money orders, cashier's checks, certified checks, personal checks and traveler's checks will be accepted for tuition and fees. ECAP also provides electronic check approval that takes funds from your checking account within 48 hours of the time the check is written to CSU. Business checks will not be accepted.
3. **Students who have presented two NSF** (not sufficient funds) checks to the university, even though restitution has been made, will be required to pay for their registration with cash, money orders, certified checks, traveler's checks, MasterCard, VISA or Discover. Business checks will not be accepted.
4. **Spring 2012 payment deadlines:**  
**Advance Registration**  
 November 14 - 30: Payment due December 2, 2011.  
**Regular Registration**  
 December 1 - January 16: Payment due January 18, 2012.  
**Late Registration**  
 January 17 - 18: Payment due January 18, 2012.

All registered students must present an initial payment to the Cashier's Office (ADM 211) to validate and maintain registration in your Spring 2012 classes. Students must present one of the following payment arrangements by the 100% reversal/refund deadline of January 25, 2012:

- Financial Aid Memo
- TMS installment plan for remaining account balance
- Bursar Office Third Party Authorization Memo
- Initial monetary down payment
- Quick Pay payment receipt

The deadline for the 100% refund/reversal to drop/withdraw from registered courses is January 25, 2012. Please make your initial payment to validate your classes and avoid being dropped for non-payment.

Failure to make a payment may result in administrative withdrawal. See Student Registration Responsibility, Student Registration Agreement, and Bursar sections for more information.

**5. Reinstatement**

Students who are eligible to register after being dropped or administratively withdrawn for non-payment will not be reinstated into course sections for which they were previously registered.

**6. Installment Payment Option**

- A. **Eligible:** All Illinois resident students registering for six or more hours during advance, regular and late registration.
- B. **Non-eligible:** Students who have tuition and fee charges that amount to less than the required deposit due to financial aid credits are not eligible. Students registering for less than six hours are not eligible.
- C. **Tuition Management Installment Plan:** Chicago State University offers an interest-free monthly payment plan to distribute your education expenses over time instead of one large payment. For more information, or to enroll, call 800-722-4867 (TMS/ 24 hours a day) and speak with an education payment counselor or log onto [www.csu.edu/](http://www.csu.edu/). Or, you can log on directly to Tuition Management Systems at [www.afford.com](http://www.afford.com). Only students enrolling for three or more credit hours are allowed to use the Tuition Management Installment Plan.

Students using the installment payment option are required to make an initial payment at the time of registration. Remember, your initial deposit must go to Chicago State or your registration will be cancelled. The enrollment fee for using the installment plan varies according to the number of payments in your plan. Whether or not you are on the installment plan with TMS, you will still pay the deferred fee amount if tuition is not paid in full at the time of registration. The deferred fee is non-refundable.

**1. TMS Refunds**

The service fee is nonrefundable; the down payment is refundable in accordance with the University refund policy. Selecting the installment payment option cannot extend the refund period. Final payment is due on withdrawals after the refund period.

**2. TMS Final Payment**

Partial or complete payment will be accepted at any time; however, the total balance must be paid according to your TMS payment plan. If you are not enrolled in TMS, the total balance must be paid by November 3, 2011. Make full payment before the deadline to avoid any additional charges.

**3. Default on TMS Plan**

Failure to make a complete payment on time according to your payment plan will cause payment default and a \$25 delinquent fee will be assessed each semester that the balance is outstanding. In addition, a hold will be placed on your academic record and you will not be permitted to register for subsequent terms until the balance is paid in full.

**4. Your financial responsibilities**

If you fail to meet the terms of your installment payment agreement, you will not be eligible for academic credit for enrolled courses. In addition, Chicago State University may report your account to the credit bureau, place your student account with an outside collection agency and assign the account to the State of Illinois Off-Set System. It is further understood that all reasonable collection costs, fees or legal expenses incurred by Chicago State University and any outside agency in securing payment is your responsibility. These fees could range from 25% to 50% of your unpaid balance.

## Refund Policy

1. **Partial reversal** (less than 12 hours): A partial reversal of tuition and refundable fee charges will be made to the accounts of students who reduce their credit hour load below 12 semester hours during the period beginning November 14, 2011 and ending January 25, 2012.
2. **100% reversal** upon complete withdrawal: A total reversal of tuition and refundable fee charges will be made upon complete formal withdrawal from the university during the period beginning November 14, 2011 and ending January 25, 2012.
3. **50% reversal** upon complete withdrawal: A 50% reversal of tuition and refundable fee charges will be made upon complete formal withdrawal from the university during the period beginning January 26, 2012 and ending February 14, 2012.
4. **0% reversal** upon complete withdrawal: No reversal of charges will be granted upon complete withdrawals after February 14, 2012.

## Policy on Returned Checks

All checks are processed through Telecheck. Any returned check will incur a \$20 Chicago State University return check fee and a \$25 fee payable to Telecheck, for a total of \$45. If you reimburse Chicago State University directly for any check you will still be assessed the \$25 fee by Telecheck, and an additional \$25 delinquent payment fee by Chicago State University.

It is the responsibility of the student to maintain a current address in the Office of the Registrar.

## Spring 2012 CTA U-Pass Policy

The Chicago State University Board of Trustees is pleased to announce that it is joining the Chicago Transit Authority to provide the U-Pass to all full-time undergraduate, graduate, doctoral and pharmacy students. The U-Pass is a discount fare card that replaces cash for all CTA fares and can be used for unlimited rides on all CTA buses and trains.

### Who is eligible for the U-Pass?

Who is eligible for the U-Pass?

- All full-time students with 12 credit hours or more are eligible for the U-Pass.
- To receive a U-Pass, you must be present when the CTA is onsite to take photos and issue cards.

### How much does the U-Pass cost?

CTA sets the price for the U-Pass on an annual basis. For the 2011-2012 academic years, the U-Pass costs \$113.00 per semester. All full-time students with 12 hours or more will have their accounts billed automatically. And any students, who have less than 12 hours, may also purchase the U-Pass for an additional cost.

### Can I waive receiving the U-Pass?

The Chicago Transit Authority designed the U-Pass program not only as a way to offer a discount to full-time students but also to increase CTA ridership. Therefore, for a school to participate in the program, CTA requires that all full-time students at the school receive the U-Pass. However, there are limited circumstances when the U-Pass may be waived if the student meets one of the following criteria:

- Student enrolled in distance learning or online courses
- Student enrolled in extension courses
- Student with disabilities
- Student studying abroad
- Student who is 62 years or older

In order for a fee waiver to be considered, the student must submit all requests in writing with supporting documentation to the U-Pass Coordinator, Bobbie Stewart, in the University Cashier's Office at ADM 211 by 5 p.m. CST on February 1, 2012. The U-Pass Coordinator can be reached by telephone at (773)995-2029 or e-mail to [upass@csu.edu](mailto:upass@csu.edu).

### Can I receive a credit towards semester parking permit?

- Students who purchased a semester parking permit will be issued up to a \$50.00 credit on their student account towards the cost of the parking permit.
- Credit will only be issued for full-time students.

### Can I receive a credit towards full year parking permit?

- NO, Students must purchase a semester parking permit to receive the credit towards the cost of the parking permit.

### How will the waiver credit be issued?

The credit waiver towards the parking permit will be issued beginning February 1, 2012. No waiver will be issued to students who purchase their parking permit after the 100 percent refund drop date of January 25, 2012.

### When is my U-Pass activated?

You will receive a new U-Pass at the beginning of each semester. The following are the dates and times for U-Pass distribution for the Spring semester:

#### Pick-up location: Jacoby Dickens Center (JDC)

- Monday, January 9, 2012 from 9 a.m. to 6 p.m.
- Tuesday, January 10, 2012 from 9 a.m. to 6 p.m.
- Tuesday, January 17, 2012 from 9 a.m. to 6 p.m.
- Wednesday, January 18, 2012 from 9 a.m. to 6 p.m.

### CTA is off campus now so where can I go with my U-Pass?

- See the U-Pass Coordinator (Bobbie Stewart) in the Cashier's Office

### When will my CTA U-Pass be available for pick up?

- Students who have completed the authorization form and contacted the U-PASS coordinator will pick up their UPASS at the Cashier's Office located in the Cook ADM 211 on the following Monday.

### Do I use the same U-Pass card for fall and spring semesters?

- Yes. Your U-Pass card will re-activated at the beginning of each semester. At the start of a new semester, the U-Pass Coordinator will announce the dates and times of U-Pass distribution for new students. Every effort will be made to distribute Pass cards before or on the activation date.
- For the Fall 2011 semester, your U-Pass will work from Monday, January 9, 2012 to Friday, May 18, 2012.

### Can I give my U-Pass card to someone else to use?

**NO.** U-Pass cards are not transferable and will be confiscated by the CTA and its holder subject to criminal prosecution if it is misused or presented for transportation by any person other than the person to whom it is issued. CTA maintains the right to inspect the U-Pass used by a student and to ask the student for another form of identification to ensure that the pass is being used by the person to whom it is issued. Furthermore, CTA maintains the right to deny a student access to the CTA system at the U-Pass reduced fee if the student does not possess both the U-Pass and a current CSU ID card.

### What do I do if my card is lost or stolen?

Lost or stolen cards should be reported to the U-Pass Coordinator, Ms. Bobbie Stewart, in the Cashier's Office. The card will be deactivated. Students may call CTA @ 1-888-968-7282 or go on line to [transitchicago.com](http://transitchicago.com) and request a new pass. CTA requires a payment of \$50.00 for lost and/or stolen UPASS.

### What do I do if my card is damaged?

Most students damage their U-Pass by allowing it to touch the magnetic strip of another card such as a credit card. If a card is damaged, it will be replaced for free, but students have to go to the Cashier's Office to request a new card. It takes five days for the replacement card to be ready and students will be given a temporary card to use while they wait for their replacement card. The Cashier's Office will notify students when their replacement card comes in and can be picked up in the Cashier's Office.

### What do I do if my card is captured on a bus?

If a card is captured on a bus, it is considered a student error. Contact the bus driver to get a receipt stating that the card was captured. Students must then take the receipt to the U-Pass Coordinator in the Cashier's Office to request a new U-Pass. It will take five days for a replacement card to be mailed to Chicago State University from the CTA. No free passes are given to students while they wait. The Cashier's Office will notify students when their replacement card is available and they can pick it up from the Cashier's Office.

### What do I do if my card is captured on a train?

If a card is captured on the train, contact the CTA personnel to write a "Fare Discrepancy Report." The CTA personnel will give the student a free transit card to get to their destination. Students will have to take the report to the U-Pass Coordinator in the Cashier's Office to request a new replacement card. The Cashier's office will notify students when their replacement card is available and they can pick it up from the Cashier's Office.

# Student Financial Aid

**Deadlines and policies** are available in the Office of Student Financial Aid and on the financial aid website. The University provides an established financial assistance program designed to best meet the needs of Chicago State University students. Assistance is available to eligible students in the form of scholarships, grants, assistantships, student employment and loans. All students wishing to be considered for financial assistance must complete the FAFSA (Free Application for Federal Student Aid).

## To be eligible for Federal Grants

Students must be enrolled in a program leading to a degree/certificate to be eligible for Federal Pell Grants, Federal College Work-Study, Federal Stafford Loans and Federal Perkins Loans.

Special students (at-large, conditionally admitted graduate students, or students enrolled in contract courses) are not eligible for state or federal financial assistance. Generally, students must be enrolled for at least halftime to be eligible for assistance from these programs.

Undergraduate students must be enrolled for at least nine hours to be considered three-quarter time, and twelve or more hours in order to be considered full time. Nine hours is considered full time for master's and doctoral candidates; five hours half-time. A change in enrollment status (hours enrolled and/or grade level) that occurs after a financial aid recipient's original registration must be reported immediately, in writing, to the Office of Student Financial Aid. Failure to report changes in enrollment status may result in overpayment, cancellation of benefits, and jeopardize future eligibility for student financial assistance.

Students selected for verification by the U.S. Department of Education or the University will be required to provide requested documentation before their financial aid awards can be processed.

## Review your financial aid status anytime

Students may review their financial aid status at any time on the CSU X-Press website. This website provides students with information relating to the amount of their financial aid awards, if any, as well as, any requirements that they might need to fulfill, such as, but not limited to, submitting verification documents, tax forms, SAP (Satisfactory Academic Progress) petitions, etc., before their financial aid package may be finalized.

The Office of Student Financial Aid no longer mails document tracking and award letters to continuing students. Instead, students are notified via e-mail that there is "activity" on their financial aid accounts and that they should go to the CSU X-Press website to review their status. All continuing CSU students have been assigned an e-mail account. It is every student's responsibility to access his/her e-mail periodically and to review any communication from the Office of Student Financial Aid.

## Student Financial Aid Satisfactory Academic Progress Policy and Procedures

Federal and state regulations require Chicago State University to establish and implement a "Satisfactory Academic Progress (SAP) Policy" for undergraduate/graduate/professional students. Chicago State University's

SAP Policy(s) measures whether students are progressing at a reasonable rate toward the completion of their educational objectives. Students must comply with the applicable SAP policy to maintain their continued financial aid (including loans) eligibility. Copies of the current SAP policies are available for students in the Office of Student Financial Aid. They are also available for review in both the undergraduate and graduate catalogs, as well as on the Chicago State University website.

## Mitigating Circumstances/Appeal Process

A student who fails to make satisfactory academic progress may petition for reinstatement of their eligibility to the Financial Aid Appeals Board. The student must document mitigating circumstances, such as injury, illness, family death or other emergencies. Petitions are available in the Office of Student Financial Aid, and are available for download from the Office of Student Financial Aid web site.

NOTE: The Satisfactory Academic Progress Policy(s) is subject to change without notice. The Office of Student Financial Aid will make every attempt to provide students with timely notice regarding their satisfactory academic progress status. However, it is every student's responsibility to read the policy and monitor his/her own progress.

## Student Loans

The Federal Stafford Loan program limits, if combined, cannot exceed the established limits and cost of attendance. During the 2011-2012 year a student may be eligible to borrow a Federal Stafford Loan based on the following limits:

You will only be eligible to borrow one loan for one academic year. For example: If you borrow \$3,500 through a subsidized Stafford Loan as a freshman, you will not be allowed a subsequent loan until you advance to the sophomore level.

February 28, 2012 is the deadline to accept "Offered Loans" or submit requests for loan revisions to the Office of Student Financial Aid. Procedures for obtaining a loan for the Spring 2012 semester are published on the Office of Student Financial Aid website at [www.csu.edu/financialaid/](http://www.csu.edu/financialaid/).

## Financial Aid Refund/Repayment Policy

If a student who receives any federal and/or state student financial assistance completely withdraws prior to the end of an academic term in which s/he receives federal/state aid, federal regulations require CSU to prorate or reduce the award(s) received, according to the actual number of calendar days in which the student was enrolled. Funds to which the student was not entitled, due to the proration calculation, must be returned to the federal/

state award program(s). If a student's charges exceed the prorated awards remaining on her/his account, a balance will be owed to the university. If a student receives a disbursement check prior to obtaining a complete withdrawal or uses some of the awarded funds for a book voucher-based upon the proration, s/he will be required to repay a portion or all of such funds to the University and/or the award program(s). Before initiating a complete withdrawal, contact the Office of Student Financial Aid at 773-995-2304 for a complete explanation.

## **Timeline Dates**

Timeline dates will be posted in the Office of Student Financial Aid for recipients of the basic state and federal financial aid programs. Timeline dates do not apply to recipients of other aid that may be based on academic performance, pursuit of a specific program/degree, etc., or aid from private sources.

## **Loan Counseling**

Students who receive loans are required to complete Entrance Counseling prior to receiving a disbursement and Exit Counseling when they graduate, drop to less than half-time enrollment, or completely withdraw from the University. Online Entrance Counseling and Exit Counseling may be accessed through StudentLoans.gov web site.

## **Federal Work-Study / Student State Aid Employment**

A limited number of positions are available throughout the university through the federal work-study and state aid funded student employment programs. Students with exceptional need are awarded FWS/SA eligibility and given the opportunity to be employed. Students wishing consideration for student employment should indicate their interest on the FAFSA. Rates of pay vary, depending upon the type of work and the level of responsibility. A student must be paid at least the minimum wage. Students are responsible for monitoring the time/hours they work so that they will not exceed their award balance.

## **Veterans Affairs Office**

Students receiving veterans benefits are required to adhere to the University's academic standing policies as outlined in the University's catalog. A change in enrollment status that occurs after the veteran's status has been certified must be immediately reported to the Veterans Affairs Office which is located in the Office of Student Financial Aid, ADM 207. Failure to report changes in enrollment status may result in overpayments. An unapproved change of program may cause termination of future benefits.

All information provided in this student financial aid section is subject to change. Any such changes and/or modifications will be reflected on the Office of Student Financial Aid website. It is the responsibility of all students to stay informed about issues that may affect their financial aid eligibility by regularly monitoring e-mail correspondence from the Office of Student Financial Aid and accessing the Office of Student Financial Aid website and CSU X-Press.

You can also fax your registration form to 773-995-2941. The deadline for registering by mail or fax is January 18, 2012.

**ON CAMPUS:** Students registering exclusively for off-campus courses can register in the Department of Extension Services, JDC 201 from 9a.m. to 4:30p.m. If enrolling in a combination of on-campus and off-campus courses, students must register via CSU X-Press.

**IN CLASS:** Unless noted otherwise in the individual class information, you may register at the first session of the class, if the course is still open. However, you are strongly urged to register prior to the first class, since some courses fill quickly.

**ON THE WEB:** Students who are formally admitted into a degree, certification, or certificate program must obtain a current registration advising PIN (RAP) from their advisor during the advisement session. An advising PIN is not required for at-large students. However, course prerequisites must be met in order to register. At-large students may begin registering online during the period of November 23, 2011 through January 18, 2012. Registrations processed January 17 - 18 will be assessed a \$100 late registration fee.

**FEES:** Tuition is based on the status of the student, not the status of the class. Tuition is subject to change.

**CLASS SIZE:** The University reserves the right to limit the size of classes and to cancel due to insufficient enrollment.

**CLASS MEETING:** Normally, classes meet once a week for 16 weeks. Sessions consist of 50 minutes of instruction each week for each credit hour (i.e., a three-credit hour course meets 150 minutes per week). Courses meeting for fewer than 16 weeks compensate with more frequent and/or longer class meetings each week, as detailed in the individual class listing.

**PREREQUISITES:** Course prerequisites are stated in the Chicago State University catalog or CSU's Website: [www.csu.edu/catalogs](http://www.csu.edu/catalogs).

### GRADUATE ADMISSION APPLICATION (NON- DEGREE STUDY):

Students enrolling in graduate courses for the first time and who are not currently admitted to a graduate degree program are required to complete a graduate-at-large application. A \$25 application fee must be submitted with the at-large application. Additionally, proof of a bachelor's degree must be submitted with the application, (i.e., copy of a transcript illustrating an awarded degree, copy of diploma, or state teaching certificate). Graduate at-large students who have not enrolled in a course at CSU within two years or more, but left in good standing, are required to apply for readmission by completing a readmit form. There is a \$25 fee for readmission. Students admitted to a program who have not attended CSU within the last two years must obtain a departmental advisor's signature. Submit your extension registration form, at-large application or readmit form, proof of degree, tuition fee and a \$25 readmission application fee to your instructor or an extension services department representative on the first day of the class, or submit to the extension services department, JDC 201, if enrolling only in extension courses.

## ORAL ENGLISH PROFICIENCY Student Complaint Procedures

*Approved September, 1991*

Illinois statute requires each public institution of higher education to "establish a program to assess the oral English language proficiency of all persons providing classroom instruction to students," and to "ensure that each person who is not orally proficient in the English language attain such proficiency prior to providing any classroom instruction to students."

Students with complaints about the oral English proficiency of Chicago State faculty should first contact the chairperson of the department involved. The complaint must be in writing and should be as specific as possible. Copies of the complaint must be sent to the appropriate college dean and to the provost/vice president for academic affairs.

The chairperson will investigate the complaint and may observe the class. If the chairperson concludes that the faculty member's English is adequate, the chairperson will notify the student, the faculty member, the dean, and the provost/vice president for academic affairs. The student may appeal the chairperson's decision to the dean. The dean will then investigate the complaint and follow the same notification procedure. The decision of the dean will be final.

If the chairperson or the dean finds that the faculty member's oral English is unsatisfactory, he or she will make a recommendation to the provost/vice president for academic affairs. The provost will take action on this recommendation and notify all parties involved of his or her decision.

Except for the necessary notifications, the identities of all students and faculty involved in oral English proficiency complaints shall remain confidential.
