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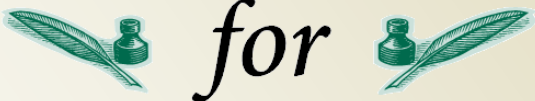
Save the Dates: Fall Writing Workshops

Cabell's Directories is intended to assist researchers in matching their manuscripts with the right publications. *Cabell's* provides journal information such as publication addresses, contact information, websites, etc. Additionally, it also describes the review process such as the number of reviewers, acceptance rate, time required for review, etc. *Directories* are available in the following areas: Business and Economics, Psychology, Education, Computer Science, Health Administration and Nursing.

Copyright Guidelines: An Introduction

“United States federal copyright law grants the creator of an [original work](#) including literary, dramatic, musical, artistic, and certain other intellectual works a number of exclusive rights. This protection is available to both published and unpublished works, regardless of the nationality or domicile of the author. Copyright protection assumes three elements: the work is original, creative, and fixed in a tangible format. The [six exclusive rights](#) are:

- The right to reproduce the work
- The right to prepare derivative works
- The right to distribute copies of the work to the public
- The right to perform the work publicly
- The right to display the work publicly
- The right to perform the work by means of a digital audio transmission.

The rights are also subject to a number of other exceptions. These exceptions, or limitations, permit use of a copyrighted work without the copyright holder's permission under certain conditions (Fair Use). It is unlawful for anyone to violate any of the rights provided by copyright law to the owner of the copyright.”

To further assist Chicago State University Library users to learn about copyright a [LibGuide](#) has been created by Li Fu, the previous Access Service Librarian of the CSU Library about Copyright. This Guide is designed to share information on copyright and related topics in 3 areas:

- Interlibrary Loans
- Reserves
- Distance Education

What's Your Back-Up Plan?

Imagine the following scenario: You're teaching an online course, and it's the day before students are to submit a major project. In an effort to answer any last-minute concerns, you've offered to hold an online help session via Collaborate (formerly Elluminate). Then, 30 minutes before the session is to begin, the server goes down, and there's no way to access your online course. *What's your back-up plan?*

1) Contact your students

Because you're a smart planner, you already made a list of your students' names and CSU email addresses. You email your students and let them know that Moodle is out of service, but you

will hold the help session via a different program. You tell them you will give them an update in 15 minutes.

2) Set up the alternate session

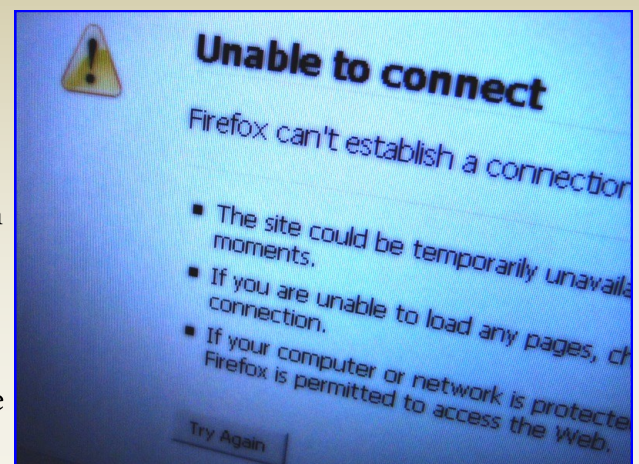

3) Update your students

Let them know the details of how they can access the new session, and you can
