## What's Your Back-Up Plan?

Picture the following scenario:

*You're teaching an online course that makes regular use of discussion forums. Every week, students must submit an original response to a discussion prompt, read what others in the class wrote, and respond to at least two of their peers. For the first couple of weeks, the discussion forums were vibrant, with students presenting a wealth of original ideas.*

*Into the third and fourth weeks, you noticed that a particularly bright student made a habit of responding to discussion prompts as soon as they were made available, submitting posts that were consistently clear, logical, and thorough.*



*The rest of the class then fell into the habit of just agreeing with that bright student, with the entire discussion forum becoming a long string of monotonous agreement.*

How can the bright student be kept from dominating the discussion fo-

rum? What's the back-up plan?

Fortunately, in Moodle 2.4 there is a discussion forum setting called "Q and A forum." With this enabled, students will not be able to see anything that their peers wrote until they post their own response. By the admission of Moodle programmers, this option was made available to encourage "equal initial posting opportunity among all students, thus encouraging original and independent thinking."

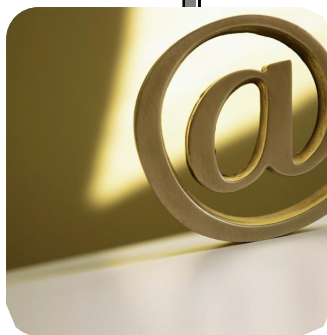
