With Respondus, exams can be created offline in a matter of minutes, employing 15 different types of questions, with tables, images, audio, and video all at your fingertips. Respondus also allows you to easily link to content on other sites, such as YouTube and Picasa.

PowerPoint/CounterPoint

The dominance of PowerPoint as the presentation program of choice has been a foregone conclusion for the past fifteen years. And the reason for that has been simple: for most people, it was the only one available.

But now that is changing, and changing quickly. Whether due to “Death by PowerPoint” syndrome or simply the desire for something different, alternative presentation programs have blossomed, thanks in large part to web-based applications. Since 2006, at least two dozen such programs

have been released, many for free. Currently, the frontrunner and biggest



threat to PowerPoint’s dominance is [Prezi](#).

Launched in 2009, Prezi is in many ways the anti-PowerPoint. It is free,

entirely web-based, and most strikingly, non-linear. It is a brainstormer’s dream, allowing you to develop connections and relationships between ideas that don’t necessarily follow a “1-2-3-4-5” hierarchical sequence.

If collaboration is your goal, however, perhaps you should consider [Google Docs](#), which has a presentation program that is straightforward and user-friendly—indeed, much like everything Google does.
