Library News: Focus on Literature Resources

Literature Database Spotlight: Project Muse

Updated continually, <u>Project Muse</u> offers full-text current and archival articles from 600+ scholarly journals from major university presses covering literature and criticism, history, performing arts, cultural studies, education, philosophy, political science, gender studies, and more.

Literature Databases

Academic Search Complete (EBSCO)

This multi-disciplinary full-text database contains over 7,000 full-text periodicals, including 6,000 peer-reviewed journals.

African American Biographical Database (Chadwyck) This database contains African-American biographical sketches from biographical dictionaries and other sources.

Black Studies Center (Chadwyck)

This resource consists of the Schomburg Studies on the Black Experience, the International Index to Black Periodicals (IIBP), two historical black newspapers (Chicago Defender and the Daily Defender), and the Black Literature Index, which consists of over 70,000 bibliographic citations for fiction, poetry and literary reviews published in

110 black periodicals and newspapers between 1827–1940.

Black Studies in Video (Alexander Press)

"This collection features award-winning documentaries, newsreels, interviews and archival footage surveying the evolution of black culture in the United States. In partnership with California Newsreel, the database provides unique access to their African American Classics collection, and includes films covering history, politics, art and culture, family structure, social and economic pressures, and gender relations."

Black Thought and Culture (Alexander Press)

Black Thought and Culture contains approximately 100,000 pages of non-fiction writings by major American black leaders and covers 250 years of history. It contains 1,297 sources with 1,100 authors, covering the non-fiction published works of leading African Americans.

Gale Virtual Reference Library (Gale)

Gale Virtual Reference Library is a database of encyclopedias and specialized reference sources for multidisciplinary research. Chicago State has access to more than 40 titles. Featured titles include Contemporary Black Biography, a 71 volume biographical reference source and International Directory of Company Histories, a massive 93 volume encyclopedia of business history.

ISTOR

CSU subscribes to two JSTOR collections. Arts and Sciences I includes 119 core journal titles in the areas of economics, history, political science, and sociology, as well as in the humanities, social sciences, ecology, mathematics, and statistics.

Literature Resource Center (Gale)

This database provides access to Contemporary Authors Online, Contemporary Literary Criticism Select, Scribner Writer Series, and Dictionary of Literary Biography Online. It also contains links to more than 250 prominent literary journals, overviews of literary works, websites, and timeline of events to help place literature in its historical and social context.

MLA International Bibliography (EBSCO)

Dating back to 1963, this database is an index of journal articles, books and dissertations. Produced by the Mod-

Lastly, Dr. Michael Danquah,

Assistant Professor of Pharmaceutical Sciences, had an article chosen for open access publication in the *Journal of Cancer Science and Therapy*. "Polycarbonate Micelles for Cancer Therapy"

appeared in volume 6(8), 310-313.

Dr. Stec's and Dr. Danquah's articles were supported through the CTRE grants program.


Oxford English Dictionary

The electronic Oxford English Dictionary presents the meaning, history, and pronunciation of over half a million words, both present and past. It also traces the usage of words through 2.5 million quotations.

<u>ProQuest Dissertations & Theses</u> (<u>ProQuest</u>)

This database is a comprehensive collection of dissertations and theses in the humanities and social sciences:

• Includes 2.4 million searchable citations to dissertation and theses from 1861.



- Features 1.2 million full text dissertations that are available for download in PDF format from 1997 forward and strong retrospective full text coverage for older graduate works.
- More than 60,000 new full text

Literature E-Books & Temporary Collections

dissertations and theses are added to the database each year.

The library purchases e-books for most subject areas, and from different vendors. Additionally, the library has partnered with other entities

to provide temporary access to ebooks.

eRead Illinois Axis 360

(Pilot Project)
