Join Dr. Tyrone Hayes, Professor, Department of Integrative Biology at the University of California, Berkeley, as he discusses his whistleblower research on the herbicide. atrazine.

His studies show how exposure to this popular herbicide chemically castrates and feminizes male amphibians, causes neural damage and hyperactivity, and induces a hormonal stress response that leads to retarded growth, slow development, and immune suppression, leading to While the disruptive effects of pesti-

cides such as atrazine are more pro-



nounced in amphibians, they affect all vertebrate classes examined (fish, repincreased disease rates and mortality. tiles, and mammals), and demonstrate a critical negative impact on public
